



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REVIVING SWALLOWS

Yesterday I saw the Xmas 2024 John Lewis TV advert. I cried my eyes out, because it touched so many nerves for me! It is absolutely beautiful!

We moved into our current house in 2012, as a family of four humans and our 76 rescued animals. We were delighted to see that we had returning Swallows nesting in our stables every year. I loved watching the parents working so hard, building their nests, raising their young and teaching them how to fly. Every year our Swallows raised two clutches of eggs. Even our ponies didn't bat an eyelid at all the activity going on in their stables 24/7!

In 2018, I went down to our stables to let our ponies out, give them their breakfast, then muck them out. As soon as I let our pony Sam out, I saw a dead baby Swallow on the concrete floor below the nest. I knew the parents had hatched five eggs...and I was so sad that they'd lost one of their precious babies. I picked it up and put it on the side in our feed room. I'd decided to take it up to our house to bury it

after I'd finished feeding our ponies and the rest of our outdoor animals.

Once I'd finished my feeding rounds, I picked up that precious, lifeless, little body and sadly walked back up to our house, with him/her in the palm of my hand. Then, as I walked into our kitchen and looked at our AGA, I wondered.....could I possibly help him or her? I quickly decided I had nothing to lose. I picked up a fluffy tea towel, wrapped the baby bird tightly inside it, with its head facing up and put it on top of the Aga. The towel soon felt warm and I started finger chest compressions on that little body, I wasn't going to give

I was alone in the kitchen, but my husband Mark was upstairs shaving. I kept working on that little body Then OMG the baby bird took a huge breath and opened its eyes! I screamed my head off – I couldn't believe what had happened! I clutched it inside the towel between my hands, as Mark suddenly appeared. I explained what I'd done. I literally had another 5 minutes to cuddle that baby, before we had to get it back

into the nest, for a chance that its parents would accept it again.

Mark climbed up the ladders inside Sam's stable. Both parents were out flying around collecting food for their babies. I handed Mark the baby bird and he placed it back in the nest, with its four siblings. We sat back and watched the parents return and they fed all five babies. Fantastic!

That summer was so heartwarming, I watched those five baby Swallows grow, learn to fly and then huddle together in the rafters of our stables, when their parents started work on their second nest!

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Winter in the Wyre Forest



This rather arresting image is part of a display in the Oxford Natural History Museum, a favourite destination of ours when we're with our young grandson. The caption under it reads,

'The UK has lost around half of its biodiversity since the Industrial Revolution to become one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world. A main cause is habitat loss, with over two thirds of land used for agriculture, industry, roads and buildings. Hedgehogs may be a casualty. Although the hedgehog population appears stable on mainland Europe, they are declining steeply in the UK for reasons that are not yet clear.'

A sad state of affairs for a much-loved and formerly familiar wild creature, and for the rest of our wildlife. Healthy hedgehogs should be hibernating by now in piles of twigs and leaves: a gap under a shed or shrub would be a favourite place. If you see any up and about at this time of year they will probably need help – perhaps a dish of cat food will make the difference to their survival.

If we love the natural world we'll look after it. Here are some suggestions for getting back in touch with nature this season:

Go on a collecting walk in the forest. Children love to collect things. Take a basket and look for cones, seed heads, twigs, evergreen leaves, berries and feathers to make your own Christmas wreath or table decoration. (Only take fallen material, and only if you have the landowner's permission).

Upload an ID app. There are plenty of free apps to help you identify birdsong, plants, butterflies etc. They add to our enjoyment of a winter walk (though you won't see many butterflies!)

Get to know the night sky. On a clear night get away from light pollution, wrap up warmly and get comfy on a deckchair or recliner and be amazed! There are planets, constellations, galaxies and satellites up there. The internet and apps will help with identifying what you're looking at, and can even tell you when to look out for the Aurora Borealis.

Make someone a wildlife-friendly present. A packet of seeds for some nectar-rich flowers (perhaps seeds from your own garden), a home-made bird feeder or bug hotel (more uses for those cones and twigs!),

Plant a tree. This is the best time of year for planting trees and shrubs. Choose a native or at least something that will provide flowers or berries for wild creatures to feed on.

Develop your artistic side. Photography, drawing and painting are all creative ways to encourage you to look carefully at your subject, so choose something natural.

Join a conservation volunteer group. This way you'll make friends, do some good for the countryside and maybe get fitter too!

South Shropshire is home to some 4,000 veterans, almost one in ten households, so remembrance brings a time of intensified emotion. During the Second World War, an outstanding group of pilots, navigators, and observers served in the Photographic Reconnaissance Unit (PRU). Known as Churchill's eyes in the sky, they provided invaluable visual insights that paved the way for victory in Europe. Despite having a 48% death rate, the PRU's heroic efforts have gone largely unnoticed – until now. The Spitfire AA810 Project is shining a spotlight on these unsung heroes, including our very own Denis Parry and Lionel Scargill from South Shropshire.

As a veteran, I am proud to support this incredible campaign, which aims to establish a national monument in their memory. I was also honoured to plant a tribute in Parliament's Garden of Remembrance on behalf of my constituents. The installation, organised by the Royal British Legion (RBL), will see the main entrance of Parliament filled with red poppies. Together with other charities, the RBL has transformed the life prospects of veterans for the better.

In the run up to October's budget I raised several issues that were important to South Shropshire. This included the need for rural councils to be given more support, to maintain the freeze on fuel duty, boost defence spending, continue the support for pubs and row back on reported plans to tax farmers. While I welcome that fuel duty was indeed frozen, I have raised my concerns about the impact of changes to inheritance tax on local farms – seven out of ten family farms will be affected. On top of this, the increase to employer National Insurance will hit small businesses such as pubs incredibly hard.

As well as recent advice surgeries in Bishop's Castle, Bridgnorth and Dorrington, I was delighted to meet with officials at Shropshire Council working on improving mobile coverage and flooding

prevention. I have called on the Health Secretary to put community healthcare facilities, such as Ludlow Hospital, front and centre of plans to transform the NHS into a 'national neighbourhood service.' I am encouraging residents to apply for gigabit vouchers which support the installation of broadband in rural areas. In Shropshire, only a third of those eligible have applied.

As part of Road Safety Week, I am raising awareness of the need to tackle speeing, after numerous conversations on speeding concerns with John Campion, the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). It was excellent to meet Morville Speed Group alongside representatives of the PCC and Dominic Stanford, who has been championing these issues. Although rural roads carry 44% of road traffic, they sadly account for 59% of road fatalities.

I know that as the weather changes, we are going to see increased flooding in South Shropshire. I used Flood Action Week to update the 'local help' area of my website to include advice and support for individuals and businesses. It is important that people set up flooding alerts and know how they can get help should they be affected by flooding. Do contact my office if I can be of any help.

Finally, I have been picking up the issue of protecting the countryside from over-development. Ministers announced a new housing methodology that slashes housing targets for London while doubling it in areas like Shropshire. Given cities like London have infrastructure to support development, I urge the government to pursue densification in the inner cities while enabling small-scale developments which enjoy local support in areas like ours. This would help people stay where they want to live and work while protecting our precious countryside.

In addition to this, we need the Minister to designate water companies as statutory consultees before planning permission is granted, to prevent development in areas with unsuitable water supply and drainage. This was raised with me as a factor that will help prevent flooding and sewage overflows into our rivers.

We are aware of the strong feeling in the town about the state of the Manor House, which was once a fine, proud building, but has fallen into shameful disrepair. This extract from the newsletter addressing the feeling is a reminder that a lot of our community are angry. JR.

FROM THE "SAVE THE MANOR HOUSE" NEWSLETTER

What have been recent developments? We have continued to explore interest from other possible parties that might have the deep pockets necessary to do something with the house, but in the last few weeks, we have written again to Cleobury Council expressing our dismay that much effort goes into presenting the High Street with regard to the Lime Trees on one side, when a complete eyesore exists on the other side. This is not the presentation of Cleobury that we want our visitors or residents to see. We have asked the council to write to the owner once again and seek information about the plans if any to tidy up the frontage of the house.

In addition, we had the opportunity to meet with Stuart Anderson or local South Shropshire MP and we were encouraged by what we heard about the actions that Mr Anderson has taken himself in recent weeks. Our MP met with the owner of the House in London recently and had a positive discussion with him about the plans for the future. We have to be a little wary at this stage as it has been 14 years since the Nursing Home was closed down overnight by Shropshire Council amid serious concerns of the level of care being provided. So to expect after 14 years that

a magic wand will be waved and everything will be ok, is perhaps a little optimistic.

However the owner has stated that the property is classed as his private residence and that 2 options exist for him at this stage.

The first option is to move back into the property as a private family home, while his second option is to potentially reopen as a nursing home. In his discussion with Mr Anderson, the owner alluded to the fact that this might be within the next 6 - 12 months. While this is indeed good news it must be noted that the previous uncorroborated evidence suggests that significant work will be needed after 14 years of neglect, to return even a portion of the house to a habitable condition.

This will surely be not without a considerable amount of investment. While previously used as a Nursing Home 14 years ago the property would not have been subject to the stringent requirements of the Care and Quality Commission (CQC). It would certainly be required to meet today's standards.

The current registration of Title Deeds shows the property owned by Marchaven Homes of which the sole Directors are Mr Zahid Iqbal and Saleema Iqbal. If a significant change in ownership has very recently occurred the assumption is that the ownership is as stated. It is also notable that both Marchaven Homes and the shell company (Marbleweb) that owns Marchaven Homes have been reporting diligently every year their status with Companies House, an indication that while physically the house is neglected, the company assets are not.

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A MEMORABLE DAY ON THE HILL

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


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

This is good evidence of the value of publicity to protect us from these crimes. The determination of these criminal gangs to succeed must be matched by our determination to continually review our awareness by signing up to trusted sources for updates and news. While not everyone accesses Social media, through this page in your local Cleobury Clarion we focus on the key items of the day to offer some level of awareness for our community.

Sometimes information could be at least 1 month out of date, but the old saying, "better late than never" comes to mind.

Some months ago this publication carried a series of articles about the emergence of Artificial **Intelligence (AI)** which is literally growing in our world at a pace. There are many good benefits deriving from technology developments, but the scammers also see benefits for them and the opportunities to line their pockets.

What is an AI scam?

An AI scam uses technology to falsely manipulate any data to mimic voice, text or images. Fraudsters typically use AI tools, including chatbots and image, video and audio-generation software to create these scams. These AI tools 'generate' text, images and other content online. Most of this software is free and accessible to anyone with a computer and internet connection. Large companies use it for genuine business, however, its increased accessibility has led to a surge in scams that use AI. This makes scams more convincing and harder to spot, which means it's important to become familiar with these new methods to stay one step ahead of the scammers.

Let's look at some brief examples of some AI scams.

Deep Fake scams use faked video where the person in it has been digitally altered to appear as a different person. Fraudsters use this technique to make it appear as if someone, usually a popular celebrity or trusted person, is saying something they're not. They can make it seem like a celebrity is promoting their phoney investment scheme with words from their own mouth. They can also

Last month after the announcement of winter fuel be used to steal people's identities or to pass verification checks and access victims' accounts as well as to create images of completely nonexistent people.

Voice cloning scams

Voice cloning is when a person's voice is recorded and then used to create audio content of that person speaking. Fraudsters can use a voice recording of someone to make them say anything that they want them to. This has been achieved often by scammers making a call to a victim and recording key words that the victim might use. AI takes over and it is possible to create a whole scripted, but false recording that sounds just like the victim. In examples that have been identified, scammers have used this method to create a more menacing version of the 'Hi mum and dad' scam. Victims receive calls out of the blue from a loved one supposedly in distress who needs them to urgently transfer money for some made-up emergency.

Advice has been given in previous articles to immediately hang up and use a different phone to check that the person or relative is really in trouble off not.

Spotting these scams.

With generative AI tools such as ChatGPT, fraudsters are able to create much more convincing messages, free from the poor spelling and grammar we've always relied on to spot scams.

But the message is always this: if you get an unsolicited call, text or email, hang up, delete it or block the sender. Genuine messages from Banks and Government agencies always come with something that verifies you individually, scammers rarely waste time trying twice, they just move on because there is always someone who falls for their tricks. A genuine caller will keep trying to contact you or leave a contact number that you can check to verify the authenticity of it.

If you use social media, only follow the sites that can be easily identified as genuine or sign up to approved information sources like Which Magazine or Neighbourhood Alert.

Trees within the Cleobury Mortimer Conservation Area

If you live in the Cleobury Mortimer Conservation Area and wish to remove or prune established trees you are required to give the local planning authority (Shropshire Council) six weeks' notice before carrying out work - this is called a section 211 notice. There is no fee for submitting a notice. You do not need to give notice if you want to work on trees less than 7.5 centimetres in diameter, measured 1.5 metres above the ground (or 10 centimetres if thinning to help the growth of other trees). Please contact Shropshire Council Planning Department for further information and advice.

AT LAST - I PLAYED MARY

When I was at primary school, I longed to be selected to play Mary in the Nativity Play. However, I was always disappointed to be issued with the big white sheet and tinsel headdress, to play 'Angel Gabriel'. "Peace be with you!" I shouted, as I ran out onto the stage, with my tissues paper wings flapping behind me. "The Lord has sent me with a special message for you. Soon you will be the mother of a baby boy and you will call him Jesus." My parents always assured me that it was 'the taking part' that counts, not getting the lead role – I disagreed!

In 1997, I became pregnant. Within a few weeks, I picked up a new hobby from our Labrador, Ashley - eating for England. I waited for my morning sickness to kick in, but sadly it never did. I craved sniffing tarmac and creosote and I longed to eat sand, cat litter, hardcore and wet stones.

At my 20 week scan, the radiographer confirmed that we were having a little boy and he was due on Christmas Day. Like every expectant Mom, I read other people's birth stories in magazines, but I knew everyone was different.

On Monday 23 December 1997, I was taken to hospital to be induced. However, by 6pm that night, nothing had happened. I was given two painkillers and wait for it - two sleeping pills. I was a little worried by the image of contracting Narcolepsy in the

middle of the birth. What if the baby came out while I was asleep, would I notice?

The next day, no baby and no Angel Gabriel to bring me news of his estimated time of arrival? Then on Wednesday, which was Xmas Eve, at last the contractions started and within an hour they were unbearable.

I was given my epidural and I was wired up to loads of machinery. Meanwhile, my husband Mark was given his own pot of tea and selection of biscuits and he settled down to watch TV! I couldn't move anything but my eyeballs, which were firmly fixed on the chocolate digestive in the middle of his plate!

I kept drifting off to sleep dreaming of gravel, cat litter, my beloved tarmac and of Angel Gabriel bringing me trays of bacon sandwiches. My midwife Paul woke me at 9pm to tell me it was time to start pushing. More people kept entering the room, sadly no wise men, donkeys nor Angel Gabriel, just people in various uniforms.

Our Joshua Joseph was born ay 11.19pm on Xmas Eve. Angel Gabriel must have been looking after him – he was just perfect!

At last, I had played Mary in my own version of the Xmas Nativity Play. Friends and family visited, bearing gifts - no wise men, donkeys, Frankincense, Gold or Mur! But we did have our little rescued Shetland Pony Sam to join us in our lounge and our little Nativity Scene was complete!


